

MITYANA OVC SERVICE PROVIDER MAPPING REPORT

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Back ground

In 2002 Mityana had a population of 265,994 persons of these 154,349 were children below 18 years representing 58% of the total population 25,602 out of 154,491 were orphans. This gives an orphans level 16.6% highest proportion of orphans was in Bulera with 19% and least in Butayunja with 4%. Total number of OVC is estimated to be 23.5% (*quote the report*)

Categories of OVC in Mityana

- Orphans who lost one or both parents
- Disabled children
- Child faced with labor
- Child abused physically and sexually
- Children neglected
- Children affected and infected by HIV/AIDS
- Children in need of alternative care
- Children on the street
- Child in conflict with the law
- Child prostitutes
- School drop outs

1. Introduction

The capacity to care is one of the Save the Children project funded by the Ministry of Gender Labor and Social Development. It is one year initiative intended to address the need of Uganda's Orphans and Vulnerable Children.

At the launching of the project, Save the Children USA was introduced to the district officials as a technical service organization to provide technical assistance and build capacity of the district government, CSOs and local NGOs in order to increase planning and coordination for OVC programmes. This was followed by an orientation of district officials on the 3rd May 2007.

Followed by a dissemination of the NOP and NSPPI to stakeholders was done from 30th to 31st May 2007.

It was during this meeting that the Community Development Workers were assigned a duty to carry out a mapping exercise for all OVC service providers in the district.

Service Providers included NGOs, CBOs, FBOs, Orphanages, schools and health centers with special OVC services like scholarships, care for disabled.

2. Mapping Process

Objectives of the exercise

- To establish the number of OVC service providers in the district
- To establish the locality of the service providers in the district
- To establish the level of compliance of the various OVC service provider with national policy guidelines
- To establish the core program areas served by the existing service providers
- To identify the service provider capacity gaps

Data collection

Methodology

Questionnaire administration

Verification meeting in every sub county

The process started with training of data collectors. They were oriented OVC guiding principles, Core Program Areas and the mapping tool. The Community Development Workers were then identified services providers in their areas of jurisdiction, visit them and carry out interviews using the questionnaire provided to them. They compiled data and presented it to the sub county authorities for verification. The CDO mobilized for the sub county meetings to include 6 technical persons, 2 political leaders and 2 CSO representatives.

Six people from the district provided support supervision in teams of two people, these included:

Team 1

- (i) District Community Development Officer
- (ii) District Environment Officer

Team 2

- (iii) Secretary Community Services Committee
- (iv) Assistant CAO

Team 3

- (v) District Probation Officer
- (vi) Secretary for Children Affairs

Areas of Supervision

Team 1: Kikandwa, Sekanyonyi and Town council

Team 2: Kakindu, Malangala and Maanyi

Team 3: Bulera, Busimbi and Butayunja

Sub county meetings were based on the following objectives;

CDW's presented a summary of OVC service providers identified in the sub counties to find out from the sub county team whether these services and providers exist in the sub county. Meetings were held as shown in the table below;

The supervisory team also met 6 caregivers and 6 children in every sub county still to verify the existence of these service providers. The team members were then required to compile and submit reports to community based service department.

3. Findings

(i) Coverage

From the mapping exercise a total of 82 service providers were recorded with Busimbi Sub county having the biggest number of 15 service providers, followed by Mityana Town Council having 11, Bulera having 11, Ssekanyonyi 10, Kikandwa 9, Maanyi 7, Kakindu 7, Malangala having 7, Butayunja having the least of only 5 service providers. Of the 82 service providers, 23 are schools, 25 Health Units and 34 CSO. Of the 34 CSOs, 5 NGOs, 8 CBOs, 11 FBO, Orphanage 3, Development groups 6 and 1 donor.

Findings from the Children, Parents and Care Givers

In Kakindu S/C not much information was known about services provided by Mityana Care Development Foundation. Services provided are counseling, referral of OVC to hospital, nutrition and education.

In Maanyi S/C Kiyinda Mityana Diocese (FBO) is highly appreciated for its work. Services offered are school fees to OVC, scholastic material, Wheel chairs to disabled children, and piglets to homes of OVC.

In Bulera S/C some schools do not provide a special package to OVC i.e. Buyoda SS. Namutamba Rehabilitation Centre appreciated for services to disabled, CSOs there concentrate in 5 parishes out of 10 and many of them do not register with the S/C.

In Busimbi S/C, there are 7 HCs providing immunization, counseling and referral with no proper records of OVC. Nakaseeta Initiative for Adult Education is known for Girl Child Education. It was difficult to identify services to OVC in schools. It was noted that ST Mauritiua mixed boarding and vocational school was not offering OVC services to children from the subcounty.

Issues of concern in Busimbi:

- The following service providers are being run as family business and these are: Send a child to school, Gtenburie Butega PS and Kuteesa Community Clinic.
- Busimbi recommended close supervision of Orphanages to reduce on abuse of children,
- HCs do not track OVC data, there was an upcoming problem of child labor e.g. children below 12 years selling maize on the streets very late at night.
- Some FBOs being reluctant to provide data on beneficiaries.
- Lack of funding to Secretaries of Child Affairs to follow up children cases
- Increased cases of child neglect and abuse.

In Butayumba SC, it was noted having only 2 service providers yet one KWOVOA had not provided any services yet. It was observed that fake organizations drain resources from OVC Care Givers thus advised a need for registration.

A service provider Kiyinda Mityana Diocese provides piglets.

In Malangala, St. Tereza Vocational School and St. Expedit were praised for real service provided to the people.

(iii) Capacity gaps

The CSOs were able to identify their capacity gaps per CPA most of them confessed inadequate funding as a major capacity gap irrespective of the CPA as well as inadequate skills and staff to manage OVC. Besides others could not identify their capacity gaps. Detailed Capacity gaps are attached.

Quality of Service Delivery Findings

As per the analysis of district data on delivery of quality services to OVC, there is still a general weakness as per a number of guiding principles in the NOP and NSPPI. The District is slightly performing above average on the following guiding principles:

- Building on Human Rights – Based approach to programming.
- Making family and community the first line of response.
- Reducing discrimination and stigmatization.
- Ensuring the participation of Vulnerable Children and Families.

The district is slightly performing below average on the following guiding principles:

- Treating recipients with respect.
- Ensuring the social inclusion of marginalized groups.
- Support service delivery through decentralization.
- Designing age-sensitive programmes.

The district is performing very poorly on facilitating community participation and empowerment. Therefore, there is need to have more attention towards empowering OVC service providers to this regard.

As regards to focusing on the most vulnerable children and communities, the district is quite performing well. 22/28 service providers are adhering to this principle, 4/28 partly adheres to the principle and 2/28 do not adhere to the principle.

Further still, as regards to networking with other organization and local government structure, OVC service providers are performing poorly. 11/28 service providers network with more than two organizations, 2/28 network with one organization and 15/28 service providers don't network with any other organization.

4. Challenges

- Some FBO's are not transparent and unwilling to share what goes on in their organizations especially number of OVC's reached and their sources of funding
- Some CSO's lack definite locations/ addresses though they are known to be offering the services so they could not be located and were left out
- Lack of records on OVC/ poor record keeping on number reached, parishes served
- Political interference whereby politicians would lobby for registration of none existent or brief case CSOs
- Existence of none – functional CSOs which services some time back and are not providing any services today made it hard for data collectors to acquire information
- Failure to register at district, sub county level especially for FBOs and NGOs made it hard for Sub county authorities to verify their existence

5. Lessons learnt

Very few CSO are operating and providing the approved OVC package

Some CSO could not identify what services they specially offer

CSOs lack OVC policy and guidelines

Support to OVC is viewed as a sources of income especially the schools so little is provided to beneficiaries

Very few caregivers are aware of existence of OVC service providers in their area only known to those benefiting

Most of CSO do not have a clear selection criteria for OVCs.

There is a tendency of CSO concentrating in only one area thus duplication of services

6. Recommendations

All OVC service providers should be provided with a copy of the NOP and the NSPPI so as to integrate the principles and core programme areas into there work plans

Need to sensitize all stakeholders on the policy and NSPPI

Mapping exercise should be an annual event so as to update the data base

The CBSD should be provided with a computer set in as a way of building capacity in order to institute a stable data base

Networking and collaboration between the service providers and the user department should be strengthened through reporting and sharing of work plans

Means to address the identified capacity gaps should be devised

7. Conclusion

The exercise provided a good start for the C2C project as documentation of CSOs offering OVC services in the district has been done. The data shall be used to ensure standards and quality in provision of OVC services among CSOs.

Appreciation is extended to the MGLSD and Save the Children US, for the technical and financial support that rendered the exercise successful. Sincere appreciation also go to the CDW's the sub county teams, the supervision teams. CSOs and caregivers for their contribution towards this noble cause. With the recommendations above put into consideration. I look forward to see OVC shine and the success of the intervention.
